

- A Lamanite queen in exigent circumstances involving the conversion of her household shows how critical it can be to set aside fear in order to defuse contention and discern the Lord's hand at work.
- Alma the Younger's initial failures at preaching to a rebellious people taught him about overbearance and the folly of trying to assert personal desires and plans over God's will.
