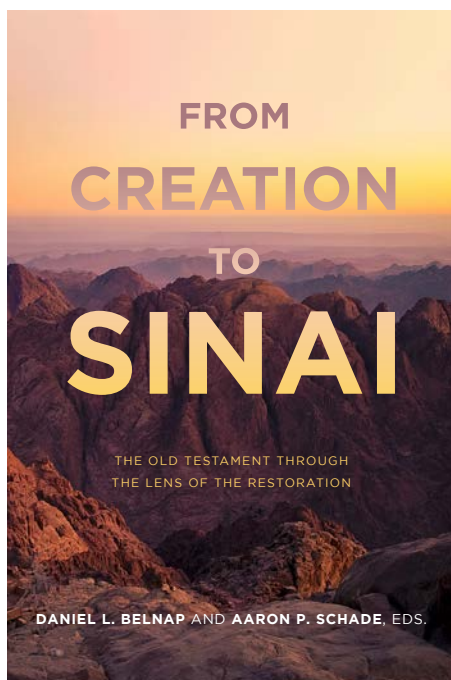

PROVO, UTAH, AND SALT LAKE CITY—For some, the Old Testament is a difficult volume to read, much less understand. The language, symbolism, and history depicted within it can be challenging and at times frustrating. Modern biblical research and the methodologies used in that research have opened up this book of scripture to greater understanding. So too have the restoration of the priesthood and continuing revelation, which have revealed that the Old Testament patriarchs are not simply literary examples of righteous behavior in the past but living beings who have engaged with the Saints in this dispensation.

This volume incorporates both academic insights and Restoration

revelation, thus demonstrating the way in which both can be used to gain greater insight into these pivotal narratives. Scripture declares that the signs of God's love are all around us. But through deep familiarity they can go unseen, their joyous message unfelt. If so, we miss out on discovering God's higher purposes and tasting the transformative power of his superabundant love and goodness.
