

JACOB: Faith and Great Anxiety



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Provo, Utah, and Salt Lake City—The Book of Mormon prophet Jacob is often overshadowed by his brother Nephi and his father, Lehi. But if we look closely at Jacob's life, we discover a prophet with an exceptional story and intriguing contribution.

The latest volume from BYU's Book of Mormon Academy explores Jacob's life, teachings, and importance. In *Jacob: Faith and Great Anxiety*, twelve scholars analyze his writings and his life, revealing connections between Jacob and Old Testament prophets, the doctrinal implications of Jacob's teachings throughout the Book of Mormon, and some of the lessons we can take from Jacob's life.

Jacob's story extends beyond the seven chapters of his book. Beginning in 1 Nephi, we learn of the fifth son of Lehi and Sariah, a child who was born in the wilderness and spent his early life journeying to the promised land.

He also appears throughout 2 Nephi. Chapter 2 contains Lehi's last words to Jacob and chapters 6–10 contain a record of some of Jacob's teachings to the Nephites. Both these records provide unique doctrinal teachings that continue to have an impact today.

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Although no single book could explore every aspect of Jacob's ministry, this volume explores his life and teachings throughout Nephi's records and in Jacob's own book. The studies in this volume take a variety of vantage points, exploring topics such as,

- The distinctiveness of Jacob's voice and literary style and the words and phrases that he uses that are unique to him,
- The ways in which Jacob draws on the Old Testament in his teachings and writings and his connections to Old Testament prophets Isaiah and Ezekiel,
- The uniqueness of Jacob's doctrinal teachings and their impact on the rest of Book of Mormon, including topics such as plainness, the flesh, demonology, and the afterlife,
- Jacob's use of white and dark in his teachings and possible racial or symbolic implications of those teachings,
- And Jacob's struggle with anxiety and what we can learn from those experiences to help us in our own struggles with mental health challenges.
