

PO NIEN (FELIPE) CHOU is a professor and religious educator for the Brigham Young University-Hawaii religion faculty. He received his BS from George Washington University and his MS and PhD from BYU. He has served in a variety of teaching and administrative assignments inside and outside the United States with Seminaries and Institutes, BYU-Hawaii and BYU Religious Education, and the Correlation Research Division. He has served in a variety of Church callings, including service as a counselor in a mission presidency, high councilor, bishop, temple ordinance worker, and member of the Church Curriculum Resource Committee at Church headquarters. In such a harsh climate, one might not expect the gospel message to thrive, but it has. Through groundbreaking first-person accounts, the authors have captured and shared the voice of the Saints in this land, highlighting vital aspects of the establishment, growth, and development of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Mongolia.
